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# THE GOVERNMENT'S PRIORITIES FOR DANISH DEVELOPMENT COOPERATION 2025

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*Expenditure framework for Danish  
development cooperation, 2025-2028*

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## SUMMARY

Denmark is and will remain one of Ukraine's closest partners. Therefore, Ukraine is a key priority in the prioritisation of Danish development cooperation. Ukraine has now been fighting the Russian military aggression for more than two years. The war is taking a toll on the Ukrainian population, who desperately need our help. Relative to our size, Denmark is among the world's largest contributors to Ukraine, and in the coming year we will further increase our support. In 2025, Denmark is increasing civil support through the Ukraine Fund to DKK 1.7 billion, which will especially support reconstruction, anti-corruption, energy infrastructure and the green transition. Not least in the Mykolaiv region, where Denmark has assumed a special responsibility. The neighbouring countries impacted by the war in Ukraine will also be in focus.

Africa's geopolitical relevance has never been greater. The Government has therefore introduced a strategy for strengthened Danish engagement with African countries. Denmark already has a decades-long history of development cooperation in many of the African countries. We must now strengthen and expand this work, and we must also use it to promote the EU's partnerships on the continent. In 2025, the Government is allocating approximately 55% of development assistance for developing countries to targeted initiatives in African countries. Of this, DKK 1.4 billion will go to new initiatives that support the Africa strategy. We must listen to needs and desires of the African leaders and populations in partner countries. One of the ways that we are doing this is by expanding our already successful programme for collaboration with public authorities (Strategic Sector Cooperation).

The total population of Africa is expected to increase significantly in the coming decades. It is important to create an acceptable, not least for the young population who want jobs, security and access to basic social services. By focusing on sustainable economic growth and job creation, we can also contribute to reducing irregular migration. Education and skills development are key to building competences and contributing to

economic growth, job creation and a future for African youth on the continent. Therefore, new funding will be allocated to strengthen exchanges, so that more African youth can study in Denmark; DKK 20 million will be allocated to continue a pilot programme focusing on master's degree programmes in areas of study relating to the green transition, while DKK 30 million will be allocated to launch a new programme for knowledge and innovation.

We are also entering the crucial years for green transition if we are to reach the targets of the Paris Agreement. Therefore, Denmark must continue to play a major role in efforts to create and lead alliances in climate diplomacy. Climate change is a very central part of development policy work today. Many of the developing countries that have contributed least to climate change are, unfortunately, the countries affected the most. And this exacerbates nearly all of the development challenges they are already struggling with. Therefore, Denmark is maintaining its special focus on climate diplomacy and on green development cooperation, including environment and biodiversity, by allocating 35% of assistance to developing countries to green initiatives.

Water will be a specific priority among the green initiatives in 2025. Water is becoming an increasingly critical resource in developing countries, and it is making the connection between climate change and development cooperation very clear. The Government therefore plans to allocate approximately DKK 1 billion to new water initiatives in Africa in the coming years. Denmark has exceptional competences to offer in the area of water. Therefore, this initiative will also be conducted in close cooperation with the Danish business community.

The Government will give significantly greater priority to strengthening trade cooperation and investments in developing countries, with a view to supporting sustainable development and the spread of market economy principles. We must contribute to increased trade and investment, not least on the African continent. Therefore, the Government is strengthening the Investment

Fund for Developing Countries (IFU), bringing the total allocation to DKK 750 million. This includes DKK 100 million for a new Africa window to expand the opportunities of Danish businesses to secure financing for collaborations between Danish and African businesses.

Unfortunately, we continue to see record-high humanitarian needs. War and a humanitarian crisis in Gaza. Acute food insecurity in Sudan. Conflicts, drought and displacement in the Horn of Africa. Climate change is impacting local conflicts and generating displacement and migration. Denmark will continue to be an important strategic humanitarian partner and donor, and we are therefore allocating DKK 3.8 billion to humanitarian assistance and nexus initiatives. Concurrently, there will be an increased focus on refugee and migration efforts in our bilateral engagements. The Government will continue to prioritise initiatives to prevent irregular migration flows towards Europe, and is maintaining the funding for the Migration and Regions of Origin Fund at DKK 700 million.

With Denmark as a member of the UN Security Council in 2025-2026, we will work to strengthen the capacity for crisis response and conflict prevention, not least in African countries where authoritarian governments, armed conflicts and violent extremism are increasingly fuelling regional instability – challenges that can only be solved multilaterally through alliances with those countries in Africa that support peace and international cooperation. Therefore, we are maintaining the level of funding for our strategic partners among the UN organisations, as well as increasing the civil support under the Peace and Stabilisation Fund to DKK 450 million in total.

The Government has prioritised allocating 0.7% of GNI to development cooperation. In the 2025 Finance Bill, this corresponds to approximately DKK 21.8 billion. Furthermore, an adjustment of the realised assistance in 2021 and 2023 enables a total allocation of approximately DKK 22.5 billion for development cooperation in 2025, *see Table 1*.

# UKRAINE AND NEIGHBOURING COUNTRIES

Denmark is and will remain among the largest contributors to Ukraine relative to our size. In 2025, we will further increase this significant support, as the needs in Ukraine are acute and enormous. Therefore, the Finance Bill proposes an increase of the civil support through the Ukraine Fund to DKK 1.7 billion. It is expected that this support will continue to have a special focus on reconstruction, especially in Mykolaiv, as well as anti-corruption, energy infrastructure and the green transition.

Denmark's efforts will focus on coordinated initiatives that promote reform processes and the green transition in Ukraine and its neighbouring countries.

This will be supported in a variety of ways, including the establishment of a new instrument to support reforms and capacity building – particularly in Ukraine and Moldova – and a new reform programme in the Western Balkans.

In addition to significant bilateral assistance to Ukraine, Denmark also provides considerable support through the EU. This includes assistance through the Ukraine facility, which supports Ukraine's plan for reconstruction and reforms. The Danish contribution to this work is expected to total approximately DKK 2.5 billion in the period 2024-2027.

# DKK 1.7 BN

The Finance Bill proposes an increase of the civil support through the Ukraine Fund to DKK 1.7 billion.

## Fact box 1:

### Examples of civil reconstruction and humanitarian support for Ukraine in 2025



Construction of critical infrastructure to ensure increased access to water and energy, with a focus on the green transition.



Reforms and anti-corruption through strengthening democratic institutions and processes, including civil society and media.



Acute humanitarian contributions, with a special focus on the most difficult to access areas and particularly vulnerable civil groups, such as women, children, refugees and displaced persons, as well as humanitarian demining.



Support for national human rights systems and civil society's help for victims of torture and human rights violations.



Business efforts through the Ukraine facility under the IFU.

<sup>1</sup> The 2025 Finance Bill allocates DKK 200 million for possible donations within the framework of reconstruction aid. In addition to the allocation on the 2024 Finance Act, a decision has been made to allocate an additional DKK 150.0 million this year for donations of equipment from the Danish Emergency Management Agency, bringing total civil support under the Ukraine Fund to DKK 1,650 million in 2024.

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## **AFRICA STRATEGY – EQUAL PARTNERSHIPS**

At a time when Africa's geopolitical relevance has never been greater, the Government will strengthen its development cooperation with the African countries. Eleven out of 20 of the world's fastest growing economies are on the African continent, and we are seeing increased demand for trade, investments, job creation and a just, green transition. Poverty and instability continue to mark large parts of the continent.

The Government's strategy for strengthened Danish engagement with African countries charts a new direction for Denmark's engagement in Africa. We must engage more in Africa. Therefore, the Government is allocating the majority of Danish development assistance to developing countries – approximately 55% – for efforts in Africa. In 2025, this corresponds to approximately DKK 9.7 billion.

Based on Denmark's long-standing development cooperation, we will strengthen our bilateral development cooperation in both existing and new partner countries, and support the Africa strategy across our efforts. In addition, we are allocating DKK 1.4 billion specifically for initiatives based on the Africa strategy in areas such as the green transition, cultural cooperation, study and exchange stays of varying duration as well as peace and security. Across these efforts, and by supporting specific EU Global Gateway initiatives, Denmark will work for strengthened EU engagement and partnership with African countries.

A total of DKK 295 million will be allocated in 2025 to support Danish engagement in EU projects in Africa.

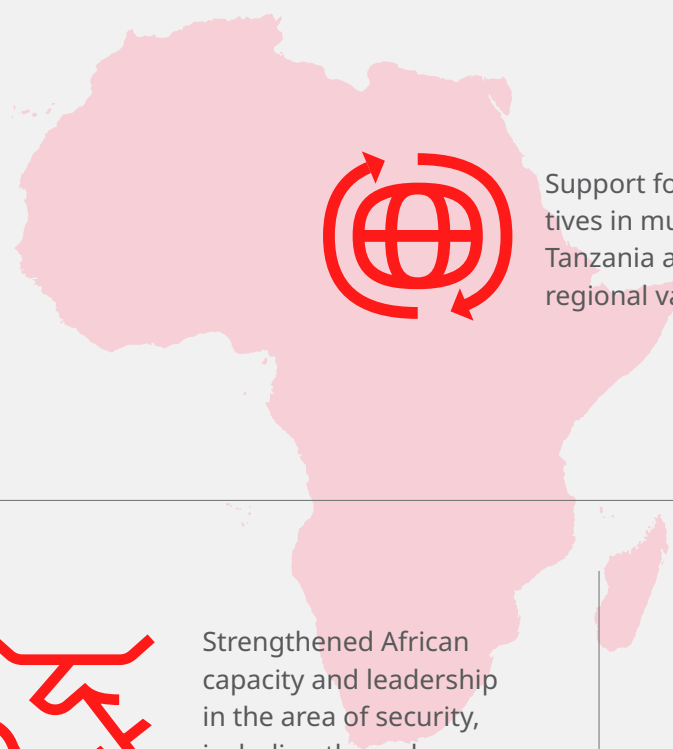
## Examples of initiatives in connection with the Africa Strategy



Support for climate adaptation and promotion of a just, green transition, including fossil fuel phase-out.



Increased focus on exchanges and educational stays.



Support for EU Global Gateway initiatives in multiple partner countries, e.g. Tanzania and Nigeria, in areas such as regional value chains and digitalisation.



Strengthened African capacity and leadership in the area of security, including through increased contributions to the Peace and Stabilisation Fund.



A new cultural initiative aiming to strengthen ties between Danish and African art, culture and civil society actors.

## CLIMATE DIPLOMACY AND GREEN DEVELOPMENT COOPERATION

Denmark has a special strength as a leading green country. Climate change is accelerating and exacerbating the development challenges faced by many countries. Especially the African countries are experiencing severe impacts of climate change. Therefore, the Government is maintaining that 35% of assistance to developing countries must go to green initiatives. This corresponds to approximately DKK 6.2 billion. Thirty per cent is targeted at climate-related efforts, of which 60% is allocated specifically for climate adaptation.

The Government particularly wants to strengthen Danish efforts in the area of water, allocating approximately DKK 1 billion over the coming years. Water is a crucial resource and one of the clearest examples of the close connection between climate and development efforts. At the same time, it is an area where Danish competencies are in demand by our partner countries and where Denmark can contribute to finding attractive solutions. Therefore, the Government will establish a new water facility to

strengthen Danish water efforts in countries where Danish programmes of cooperation with public authorities (Strategic Sector Cooperation) have already been established in cooperation with the business community. In addition, we will launch new water initiatives in Ghana, Uganda, Rwanda and South Africa.

Denmark will continue to be the leading green country that can accelerate the green transition and climate finance agenda. The Government therefore plans to initiate new bilateral energy programmes (DEPP) with Brazil and Kenya, as well as to extend the existing energy programme in India.

The needs are enormous, and development assistance alone cannot finance them all. Therefore, development assistance must also contribute to mobilise private capital for sustainable investments in climate adaptation. Among other efforts in this respect, the Government is allocating DKK 200 million to increase both the speed and scope of mobilised climate finance, with a particular focus on investments in adaptation. This initiative complements other instruments that gear development assistance and mobilise private capital for sustainable and green investments, including not least the development banks and the IFU.

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## PRIVATE SECTOR, INVESTMENTS AND TRADE

The Government wants to strengthen trade cooperation and investments in developing countries – not least in African countries. These efforts must support sustainable development and the spread of market economy principles. The Government will contribute to this with a new multiyear programme in East Africa and on the continent to promote free trade and regional economic integration.

Denmark is launching a new initiative focused on strengthening corporate responsibility in global value chains, creating sustainable exports, and contributing to companies' adaptation to EU sustainability requirements. This initiative aims to further develop the great potential of African businesses for increased trade and access to the EU market.

Denmark must continue to develop instruments that can contribute to mobilising private capital for sustainable investments and increased trade in developing countries. To increase investments locally and expand the opportunities of Danish business in Africa, a new, DKK 100 million Africa window is being established under the Investment Fund for Developing Countries (IFU) to supplement last year's reform of the IFU. The Government is thereby strengthening the IFU and allocating a total of DKK 750 million to the IFU in 2025.

A particular area of focus is supporting climate finance and investments in Africa. Through Strategic Sector Cooperation, Denmark contributes to competency development of partner country authorities in the sectors that are especially in demand by our partner countries, and where we have Danish business competences that can contribute to positive development. Therefore, Strategic Sector Cooperation will be further strengthened in 2025.
